
Featured Biologist: Tom Pratt, Fisheries And Oceans Canada



Tom was born in Oakville but spent his formative years fishing for sauger, redhorse suckers and goldeye on the banks of the Assiniboine River in Winnipeg. His parents, a banker and teacher whose appreciation of the outdoors was primarily confined to the fairways of country clubs, were surprised to discover an avid biologist in their midst. The rearing of native fishes at home, particularly darters, resulted in an enthusiasm for aquatic conservation that remains evident today. With a fisheries career goal always at the forefront, Tom completed a B.Sc. (Zoology) at the University of Manitoba, where he credits Drs. Mark Abraham and Ken Stewart for fostering his interest in fishes and their behaviour. In 1995. Tom returned to Ontario to undertake graduate training at Trent University's Watershed Ecosystem Graduate Program. Under the guidance of Dr. Michael Fox, Tom completed a M.Sc. investigating the importance of predator communities in structuring pumpkinseed life history strategies. Tom remained at Trent to undertake a Ph.D., studying the importance of growth and habitat selection on the survival of age-0 walleye. This experience led to a short stint as a postdoctoral fellow on a walleye stock identification project at the University of Windsor's Great Lakes Institute for Environmental Research under the tutelage of Dr. Peter Sale. In 2001, Tom was approached by the Great Lakes Laboratory for Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences about a position with Fisheries and Oceans Canada based in Sault Ste. Marie, and he happily accepted. Since then, Tom has been contentedly observing fishes in their natural habitats, studying the effects of habitat manipulations on fish production, and researching ways to improve native fish passage and sea lamprey barrier dams. He has also become interested in the rehabilitation of Lake Superior tributary spawners; particularly lake sturgeon and coastal brook trout. Any free time is spent outdoors with his wife Kim, and their two young children.

AFS Annual Meeting 2004: Madison - Less Than 1 Week To Go!!

We would like to encourage all Ontario Chapter members to attend the 134th Annual Meeting of the American Fisheries Society at the Monona Terrace in downtown Madison, Wisconsin, from August 22nd through August 26th, 2004. The theme celebrates Wisconsin's name (which has been translated as "gathering of waters") and Wisconsin's celebrated ecologist Aldo Leopold. Best known for his "land ethic" and as a pioneering figure in wildlife management, Leopold defined land as "a community" that explicitly embraced fish and water.

If you are planning to attend you may register in one of three ways:

1) Using the American Fisheries Society's **online registration system**.

2) By printing out the **2004 AFS Annual Meeting Registra-** **tion Form**, filling it out, and mailing it to the address listed on the form along with the appropriate registration fee.

3) By filling out the registration form that has appeared in the last few issues of *Fisheries* and returning it, along with the appropriate fee, to the address listed on the form.

The cost to attend this year includes an early registration fee of \$295 which increases to \$395 after July 23. Non-AFS members must add \$100.00.

Student registration is \$95. Non-AFS members must add \$30.00. (Students include post-doctoral students and individuals accepted to graduate school in fall, 2004. You must include either a copy of your student ID or a letter from your advisor or department to gualify for student registration.) 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Leslie M. Frost Centre Closed

As many of our members have likely heard, the Leslie. M. Frost Natural Resource Centre was recently closed. As of Wednesday July 14, 2004 the Frost Centre's operations by the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources have ceased. Programming and/or bookings are no longer offered at the facility. All hiking and ski trails, canoe routes and the Haliburton Highlands Water Trails remain open for your continued enjoyment. The Frost Centre website is no longer available.

The executive committee of the AFS-OC have submitted a letter to the Honourable David Ramsey, Minister of Natural Resources in response to the Frost Centre's closing. Below you will find an excerpt from that letter. Please check our website (http://www.afs-soc.org) for the full content of the letter.

"The Ontario Chapter of the American Fisheries Society (AFS) would like to voice our disappointment at the proposed closure of the Leslie M. Frost Natural Resource Centre. The American Fisheries Society is the oldest and largest organization of professional aquatic biologists in North America with over 120 members in the Province of Ontario. As resource professionals we have been intimately associated with the Frost Centre over its history. Since the incorporation of the Ontario Chapter of AFS, the Frost Centre has served as home of our Annual General Meeting and we are now into our second decade at the centre. As resource professionals we realize the importance of outreach, education and communication and the Frost Centre was a key component of OMNR in its dissemination of information, training of MNR staff and other professionals and

outreach to students and the public. ... The use of the Frost Centre by students, the education and the outreach provided by the centre were invaluable to [student] development. The education of students through the Frost Centre increases the awareness of the environment and often plants the seeds for the next generation of environmental managers and scientists. ... In closing the Ontario Chapter of AFS cannot support the closure of the Frost Centre. We ask that you reconsider the closure, revisit funding options, explore new and innovative cost sharing that will ensure this valuable resource can be maintained for future generations. ..."
