President's Message



With a winter storm raging outside, fisheries and aquatic management in general seems a long way off to all of us. However, this is the time to finish off those reports on last year's field season, take stock of our work for the next field season and hone our skills and exper-

tise for the tasks at hand.

I have been reflecting on how appropriate the AFS 2008 theme, "Fisheries in Flux - How do we ensure our sustainable future" is to the various issues evolving in Ontario. We have enormous pressures on our freshwater ecosystems, fish and fisheries, including: climate change; invasive species; new pathogens and diseases, and increasing human development. It can appear overwhelming at times. However, in my opinion, this simply means that we must change the way we do things and how we interact as professionals and scientists with our peers in other disciplines. This then is our other major pressure or challenge: we MUST break down the silos between our disciplines and organizations and learn to work more closely together to solve the issues identified above. Albert Einstein once said, "We cannot solve today's problems with the same level of thinking that created them". No truer words have been spoken. We as aquatic and fisheries professionals must take steps to integrate our understanding of our science with the understanding of other disciplines and professionals. We must be willing to share ideas and learn the vernacular and principles of other related disciplines. In this way we will begin to make progress in understanding and applying better solutions in the field: solutions that truly reflect a world view of environmental sustainability.

With that in mind, I want to draw your attention to the information in this newsletter on the proposed workshop series on Watershed Science and Management being proposed this coming year. A great deal of work has been done on this subject by the Education Committee with the support of members, Samantha Mason and Christine Tu. Please take a look and consider joining us in these workshops. Our intent is to present both the theoretical and practical linkages of the various disciplines in river and watershed science so that we as biologists can work with colleagues in other disciplines in order to be more effective in managing Ontario's freshwater ecosystems.

Another challenge that we as a Chapter face is to stay the course with our commitment to the AFS 2008 Annual Meeting. Under the capable direction of the Organizing Committee Chair, Dave Maraldo, the Annual Meeting plans are coming along very well. I would, however, like to emphasize once more that we are the host Chapter for the Annual Meeting and I would urge you, if you have not done so yet, to contact either Dave Maraldo (ottawa2008@afs-oc.org), Lynn Bouvier (treasurer@afs-oc.org) or myself, to volunteer to help with the meeting. Our three biggest needs right now are for assistance with the Fund-raising committee, the Raffle committee, and for volunteers during the event itself. So, consider this a CALL TO ACTION. We need all your help to make this the great Annual Meeting that I know it can be. I feel confident that we can meet the challenges and stay the course!

Ontario Freshwater Fishes Life History Database

The AFS-OC is proud to be affiliated with the Ontario Freshwater Fishes Life History Database (OFFLHD). Once hosted by the Ontario Chapter, the OFFLHD now has its own domain (**www.fishdb.ca**). This website is an unparalleled source of information concerning the fishes of Ontario. Researchers, consultants and students alike agree this interactive searchable database provides a valuable resource to all those interested in Ontario freshwater fishes.

The OFFLHD is a fully searchable database for all Ontario and adjacent Great Lakes freshwater fishes including introduced, extirpated and extinct species. It contains current information pertaining to life history, habitat, size and age, distribution, status, reproduction and no-

menclature for 150 species, 3 subspecies and 2 established hybrids. The website also includes photographs, range maps, notes, references, glossary of terms and related web links.

The View From Up Here



Ummmmm

I recently had the opportunity to spend a month (October 2007) in China. It was purely a vacation, no work involved. My wife, a

friend (who is from China) and I spent the month travelling around central China, visiting the major tourist sites (the ones that westerners know about and the ones that the Chinese know about) and visiting our friend's family. We were afforded incredible hospitality everywhere we went. One of the manifestations of this hospitality (and there were many!) was that we were continually served fish. Meat is a treat and fish is the penultimate treat (at least in the places that we went!). Being raised in a British household I was taught to eat what you are served whether you want to eat it or not. I don't dislike fish; I am very fond of it in fact. The local butcher who has fresh whitefish and lake trout, the all-you can eat Friday fish fry at the Moose hall or the curling club, and Clarence's fish market in Algoma Mills (halfway between the Soo and Sudbury) are places that I regularly visit. So why would I not want to eat fish served to me in China you ask. Well, I couldn't get the thought out of my head that Chinese fish would be subjected to less food safety scrutiny than North American fish. Since returning I have done some research into the food safety in China and have found that they do have standards and enforcement of those standards. But at the time I just didn't know and didn't want to offend anyone by asking.

My bias, of course, comes from living in Canada and eating fish caught from what I consider to be "pristine" lakes that are abundant in Canada. I know that the Canada Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) and the Ontario Ministries of Natural Resources (OMNR) and Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) have or are developing fish programs related to inspection and food safety. I also know that generally we have excellent water treatment facilities here. But in reality, I have to admit (mostly to myself) that in Ontario we also have 15 areas of concern (AOC) with issues in each AOC related to fish and water quality, we have an ageing infrastructure (storm drains and sewers) that may or may not be affecting water quality and we have some waterborne diseases (not to say that these diseases are a human health issue!). If this knowledge doesn't change my fish eating patterns in Ontario it shouldn't really do so in other parts of the world either. Maybe because I also know that progress is being made at solving or reducing the issues affecting fish health in Ontario (GLAP and the revitalization of the RAP process) and I know that China's issues are just emerging.

So, during my month in China, I wondered about

food safety whenever I was served fish. Did it stop me from eating the fish? No, not at all, it tasted great.


