#### 2012 Ontario Chapter AGM Summary by Brian Morrison

The 2012 Ontario Chapter Annual Meeting and Conference was held March 1<sup>st</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup>, at Viamede Resort on Stoney Lake. There were eighty-one registrants (35 of which were students!) for the 2-day meeting. Twenty-one talks covering a range of subjects from MNR's Broadscale Fisheries Management initiative to genetic characterization of species complexes were given. Fourteen students presented orally and it was judged that William Glass (University of Windsor) gave the best presentation, thus winning the E.J. Crossman Award. Shannon Fera (Trent University) was presented with the Ontario BASS Federation Nation (OBFN) Award for the best student poster. A special session led by Dean Fitzgerald and Silvia D'Amelio included identification of possible topics for workshops and member training at future events. The Business Meeting was held on Friday afternoon and included an update on the North Central Division activities by NCD President-Elect Gary Whelan, as well as the usual business meeting updates from our Treasurer and Membership Chair. Nominations for the Ontario Chapter Executive Committee were solicited for two

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

#### Earth Day 2012

April 22 - Earth Day is a day set aside for us to reflect on the Earth's natural environment. Earth Day was allegedly introduced by John McConnell in 1969. It was first observed in San Francisco and other cities on March 21, 1970, the first day of spring. Around the same time, a separate Earth Day was founded by United States Senator Gaylord Nelson on April 22, 1970. While the initial April 22 Earth Day was focused in the United States, by 1990 it was being celebrated in 141 nations. Earth Day is now coordinated globally by the Earth Day Network and is celebrated in more than 175 countries every year. Numerous communities celebrate Earth Week, an entire week of activities focused on environmental issues.

had record attendance from the standpoint of sponsors, members, and most importantly students; we had six contributed posters as well, and that may also be a record but it was nonetheless positive. Our members contributed presentations that allowed us to discuss a myriad of topics of historical and current relevance along with the business of our Chapter; it also appears that this meeting motivated several individuals to step forward to volunteer for different positions within our Chapter. Thus, I view our meeting as a success but please also see the column that is dedicated to the meeting in this newsletter for a full review. Moving forward, we are presently planning several meetings to allow our members to interact across Ontario, including Thunder Bay, Ottawa, and Windsor. Our Chapter will provide funds to complement these future interactions but they will only occur because a member in those locales has taken on the responsibility as host. We seem to be moving in the right direction to finish strong this year.

During 1994, I started my M.Sc. at the University of Waterloo, to assess the relationship between land use and the biological, chemical, and physical features of small streams. This assessment allowed for the interactions with students and researchers at different universities, with scientists at the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources, with individuals at the Grand River Conservation Authority, professionals from groups such as Trout Unlimited along with land owners like farmers, businesses, and universities. Our approach allowed for the detailed assessment of three streams, from headwaters to the confluence with the Grand River, and the quantification of key endpoints. From this effort, we were able to contribute several articles, complete conference presentations, and prepare other documents that describe the relationships observed. These contributions documented some of the linkages evident between land use and stream endpoints, and provided the basis for my future interactions with individuals from different groups to collectively complete a multi-faceted study.

#### **History Bytes**

There have been 3 Secretaries of the Ontario Chapter of the American Fisheries Society (AFS-OC). One of those was also the last Secretary of the Southern Ontario Chapter (AFS-SOC). There were 12 Secretaries during the 25 years of the Northwest Ontario Chapter (NWO-AFS) and there were 7 Secretaries during the 16 years of the AFS-SOC. The average tenure of a Secretary in the NWO-AFS was 1.5 years (range 0.5 to 3 years) but the position was combined with the Treasurer position. The average tenure of a Secretary in the AFS-SOC was 2.3 years (range 1 to 4 years) and the average length of time that a Secretary served the AFS-OC was 3 years (range 1 to 4 years).

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#### View from Up Here by Bill Gardner

I like to travel, I always have. My parents took me and my siblings on some neat adventures while we were growing up, Florida and Scotland being the furthest trips from home. I am always on the lookout for a unique place to travel to. A friend sent me a link to a resort where she suggested I might take my next vacation. The resort is located in Fiji and has 25 underwater (40 feet below the surface) luxury rooms (more like pods!). Although this resort is a smidge out of my price range (\$15,000 per person for a week (but only 2 nights actually underwater)) it reminded me about how much I love being underwater. I can still remember the first time I saw 20,000 Leagues under the Sea. Aquaman was always a favourite character on the Super Friends (way better than the Wonder Twins) and I spent many hours as a child with a mask and a snorkel in the water watching the underwater world. I bring this up because looking at the Fiji resort website reminded me about an article I once saw in the Journal of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada about an underwater observation platform that was located in Lake Huron. The paper by Alan Emery (Journal of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, 1973, 30(6): 761-774) detailed underwater observations of fishes near Tobermory from the underwater platform. Divers would swim to the platform, day or night and spend hours observing fishes. A quick internet search revealed the long history of Sublimnos. An underwater observation platform built by Dr. Joe MacInnis, this platform has had a pretty spectacular existence. Sadly, it is currently sitting in a field near Lake Ontario (you can do an internet search and read all about how it got from Lake Huron to Lake Ontario). As spring turns to summer Sublimnos will once again be visited by many divers, sadly none of them in the water. As for me, I will continue to snorkel and SCUBA dive out at the cottage, watching the fish, and dreaming of living under the sea. Until then, Happy Fishing.

## **Gyotaku Fish Printing**

Gyotaku (pronounced ghee-oh-tah-koo), ("gyo" = fish, and "taku" = impression) is the Japanese art of fish printing which originated in Japan in the mid to late 1800's. Its original intent was to record trophy catches before the widespread availability of the modern day camera. Many of us in this field who attended the University of Guelph in the 1970's to 1990's were first exposed to this art form in Ichthyology classes. Gyotaku has become a popular art form with widespread appeal to both anglers and art lovers.

Gyotaku has two distinctly different methods, the direct method, and the indirect method. The direct method involves painting the side of a fish and then pressing paper or fabric on to the fish. When the fish is lifted the paper will reveal a detailed mirror-image. The indirect method involves taking a wetted piece of paper and pressing it over the body of a fish, and then colouring the raised surfaces of the fish on top of the paper using a cotton ball dabbed in paint. 




